Who's Who in Laurelhurst

DR. J. R. MORGAN, DENTIST, 946 East Burnside

Do you remember the time you had to go to the dentist when you were about seven or eight years old? The time you had that nagging ache in one tooth and repeated home-doses of oil of cloves and applications of hot water bottles didn't seem to be much help? Remember how the dentist held the drill sort of behind him and said "Now, Junior, just open your mouth up wide; this won't hurt a bit" and then jabbed the whirring thing down into that sore tooth and proceeded to lift the top of your head right off?

Lots of grown-ups remember those childhood dentist experiences . . . they remember, too, how the next time they had a tooth-ache they went quietly off by themselves and neglected to mention it to Dad, so they wouldn't have to go through THAT again.

Dr. J. R. Morgan thinks that method of dealing with young dental patients was entirely wrong. He is a pioneer in children's dental work, and from the many youngsters who occupy his dental chair he has learned that deception about pain is one thing children never forgive. Dr. Morgan doesn't tell Junior to open his mouth because it won't hurt when he knows well enough that it is going to hurt. He tells Junior instead that this may hurt some, but that men seldom cry or make a fuss over things like that, and it will be over soon and to be as brave about it as he can. Junior, upon being thus taken into confidence, grabs the arms of the chair in two small hands, hangs on tight and makes up his mind that he won't yell if he can possibly help it. Dr. Morgan first occupies himself with inspiring confidence in the child; from then on, he states, half the annoyance and delay in working with children's teeth is eliminated.

From North Carolina, his native state, Dr. Morgan brings a soft voice and a gentle manner. After two years of study in dental college in Atlanta, Georgia, Dr. Morgan came to Portland in 1906 to finish his preparatory work at North Pacific College. After graduation in 1908, he went to Moro in Eastern Oregon, where he practiced dentistry for over twenty-three years. When Dr. Morgan looks you in the eye and says he practiced for twenty-three years you know he isn't storying, but honestly, he doesn't look it.

Last November Dr. Morgan located his office in his home at 946 East Burnside. He has a completely modern, light, attractive operating room and his tastefully decorated home forms an inviting reception room.

Dr. Morgan has a hobby—archery. While in Eastern Oregon he often indulged in archery-golf, an interesting game played over a golf course, with bows and arrows substituted for drivers and mashie-niblicks, and targets erected on each green. This, Dr. Morgan claims, forms one of the most fascinating sports possible, and in

addition to being a splendid form of exercise, it combines the historical spirit of archery with the more modern atmosphere of the golf course.

Archery commands just as fine technique as golf or tennis, Dr. Morgan explains. It dates back to the days when not only warfare but commercial hunting were carried on by bow-and-arrow methods, and once taken up, proves as completely engrossing as any other more publicized sport.

The membership rolls of lodges including the Elks, the Masons and the Odd Fellows, hold the name of Dr. Morgan.

Another of his interests is music. "I am no musician," Dr. Morgan admits, "but I appreciate music and enjoy it." He sings in the choir at Central Presbyterian church. The choir, incorporating some twenty-five or more voices during the other months of the year, is enjoying a two-months' vacation now, with music for the

Double Feature Friday-Saturday

Fulfilling the promise of the best in entertainment the Laurelhurst Theatre brings to the screen a double feature program Friday and Saturday. One half of the program features Bill Boyd and Ginger Rogers in the thrilling romance of the big trees, "Carnival Boat".

This picture puts the motion back into motion pictures. The dialogue is sufficient and good but this romance of the big trees shines most brilliantly in its action and the thrilling sequences which take place in a mountain logging camp.

Boyd is seen as a young lumberman, son of the camp boss, Hobart Bosworth. The woods are his playground instead of his work-shop and his father is disappointed that the young man does not have the ambition to succeed him when his not-distant retirement is necessary. Bill's chief interest is Ginger Rogers, who has the role of a fiery-haired little dancer and singer aboard a show-boat.

Colorful Carnival Scenes

Colorful carnival boat scenes are varied by thrilling moments when Boyd and the lumbermen strain every sinew to get the show-boat moving toward the mill. One of the dramatic highlights comes when Bosworth attempts to take a too heavily loaded train of logs down the mountain and the brakes refuse to hold. Boyd, by riding across a lofty mountain high in reaches the train and by wrecking a portion of it, saves his father from death.

This incident drives the thought into the young man's head that his father's sacrifice was to help him and he takes the entire camp in hand. He even forgets his red-headed charmer.

The climax of the picture is found in the dynamiting of the log jam in which Bill becomes a hero after saving a scoundrel who has been attempting to ruin him.

This picture represents the first attempt any producer has made to take a microphone into the big trees and RKO Pathe has done an excellent job of it.

Albert Rogell directed. Supporting members of the capable cast are Fred Kohler as "Hack", the menacing plotter; Marie Prevost in the role of "Babe", the show-boat queen; and Edgar Kennedy and Harry Sweet as "Baldy" and "Stubby".

The second feature on this double bill brings Marian Marsh and Warren William in "Beauty and the Boss", based on a play which kept New York laughing for many months last season. On the stage it was known as "The Church Mouse", and starred Miss Ruth Gordon.

The instantaneous success of "The Church Mouse" soon had many movie producers bidding for the screen rights. Warner Bros., realizing that the story fitted perfectly with the personality and ability of Marian Marsh, outbid all other companies, and "The Church Mouse" was put into immediate production under the title of "Beauty and the Boss".



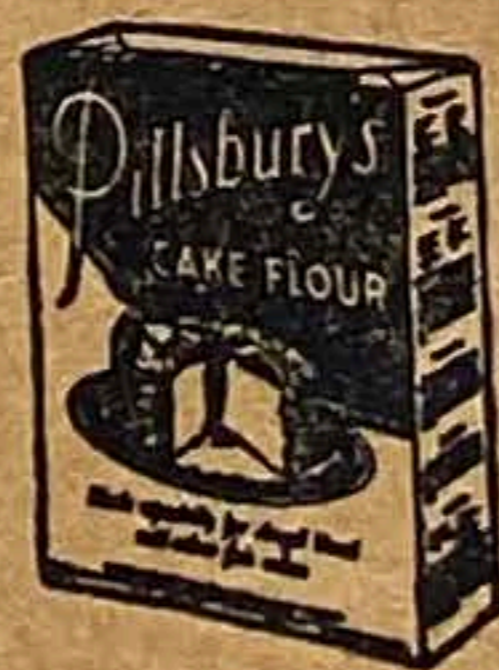
