Rob Nosse has been a state representative since 2014. He has recently served on the Ways and Means Committee, where he co-chairs the sub-committee for human services, and he also serves as Vice Chair of the House Behavioral Health Care Committee. In those two roles, Representative Nosse was able to steer more than one billion dollars in federal and state marijuana revenues into a series of behavioral health bills and budgets during the 2021 and 2022 sessions -- one of the largest investments in behavioral and mental health in decades. He was recently appointed to serve as the chair of the House Health Care Committee. He is also one of two Majority Whips; in that role he is responsible for working with other members of the Democratic Caucus to assure support for passage of important bills and priorities when final votes come.

Rob lives in SE Portland with his husband Jim. He is the proud father of two Portland Public Schools alumni, and the grandfather of three prospective PPS students.

Rob is an activist/advocate at heart. He has spent his entire working life trying to make positive social changes for students and working families that improve their lives.

The Anna Mann House is located on NE 33rd St. at NE Holladay Street and will provide 128 units of affordable housing with 64 parking spaces. AMH has committed to giving every resident a Trimet pass and will provide bike storage for residents. EV charging stations will be provided. AMH will inform residents who have cars of PBOT parking regulations. On-street parking close to the development is expected to be in high demand. (Read more about innovative solutions to limited street parking in the May LNA newsletter.)

Several residents have moved into the East Building of the Anna Mann House. The South Building will be completed at the end of July and the main, historic building will be completed by the end of September.

The apartments are intended for low-income households, especially families, immigrants, and people of color. Wraparound services and a full-time staff member will be on-site to help residents of all the buildings maintain housing stability.

This will include the participation of mental health nonprofit <u>New Narrative</u> (previously Luke-Dorf), which will provide off-site care and addiction services.

The LNA has made a generous donation to the Anna Mann House to aid in the construction of a children's play area, which will be available for all residents of the Kerns and Laurelhurst communities to enjoy! The playground will be completed by the end of October.

IHI expects the Anna Mann House to be home to 60-100 children. As of July 11, however, no school-aged children had moved in. The LNA's IDEA committee has been working with Laurelhurst School staff and PTA officers, Anna Mann staff and the staff of PBOT Safe Routes to Schools to help new Laurelhurst School students walk or ride safely through the neighborhood to school. Once children have moved in, plans for students' safe travel to school will be in place and volunteers will be needed to carry out those plans. Well, summer is almost behind us; it will soon be pumpkin spice latte season. I hope everyone had a pleasant summer and was able to enjoy some of the activities Portland had to offer.

Since the May Newsletter, a lot has happened in our neighborhood. In May, the LNA held elections for four board seats. After the votes were counted, we have two new board members. David Tunley is our new SEUL Rep and Benn Egan the new treasurer. In addition, the following board members were reelected to the board: TJ Browning (Vice President), Steven Rebischke (SW Quad Rep) and Abigail Smock (SE Quad Rep). A total of 146 votes were cast: 28 in-person votes and 118 electronic votes. A big Thank You to Jake Cann and Dian Odell for their hard work in organizing and executing the LNA board elections.

At the May Annual Membership meeting, LNA signed a Good Neighbor Agreement with the Anna Mann House (AMH), Innovative Housing Inc. and the Kerns Neighborhood Association. This was the culmination of discussions that have taken place over the last year, spearheaded by interim Land Use Committee chair, Merideth Driscoll. (See related article on page 1.) Residents have started moving into The AMH and occupancy will continue to ramp up well into the fall.

Thanks to a \$5,000 donation from the LNA, children living in the AMH, as well as all children in the bordering neighborhoods, will get to enjoy a new natural playground. This money was raised from the LNA bottle drop fund. We look forward to the completion of this fantastic outdoor play space.

The LNA held its annual garage sale on Saturday, June 24. The neighborhood was abuzz with activity; over 96 households participated in the sale. This year we had an interactive map on the LNA website and a QR code where eager shoppers could get details and information digitally. Thank you to Shar Ainsworth, Dian Odell, Jake Cann and David Tunley for making the garage sale such a success.

To round out the summer activities, many neighbors came out on August 1 to enjoy the annual Laurelhurst summer picnic at the Laurelhurst Club. Live music, free ice cream, a pizza truck, face painting, balloon art, and a visit from the Portland Fire Department (Engine 9) made for a great community-building event. Thanks to Abigail Smock for organizing this year's LNA picnic.

Meet Benn Egan, LNA's new Treasurer

Last May the LNA membership elected Benn Egan to the position of LNA Treasurer. The Newsletter editor recently tracked Benn down, in between bike rides to his gym, work in his garden, and his day job with MIT's Sloan School of Management, to find out a little more about him than can be gleaned from his candidate statement published in the May Newsletter.

LNAN: Benn, your candidate statement informed us that you work remotely for the MIT Sloan School of Management in Cambridge, Massachusetts as a financial analyst. What drew you to the position of LNA Treasurer?

BE: As a fairly recent transplant from Boston, I wanted to find ways to engage with my new community here in Portland. Shortly after we arrived here, the LNA Newsletter arrived on my front porch and I was very impressed with it. The idea that the Newsletter is still published in paper form and hand-delivered by members of the community intrigued me. It occurred to me that the LNA might be an avenue into community involvement. So I emailed the President, Kayleen Kusterer, and told her of my interest. Kayleen suggested that my background in finance made me a likely candidate for the Treasurer's job. So I joined the Finance Committee, where I developed a bit of a feel for the financial side of LNA's operations, and when the Treasurer's seat opened up it felt natural to enter the running. BE: My wife Daniela is from Ashland and she has family all over Oregon. We had always visited the state frequently and had long been thinking about relocating. Our son Malcolm was reaching school age and we had to make a decision: either stay in Boston and become entrenched in the schools there or make the move to Oregon. There was nothing really tying us to Boston -- I knew I would be able to keep my job by working remotely and Daniela would be able to work from home as well. So we made the jump.

LNAN: What goals do you have as Treasurer?

BE: Well, I'm still pretty new at the job, but I do have some thoughts. LNA's acquisition of the Laurelhurst Club in 2021 has given the organization a financial boost. I would like to be part of exploring how best to use those assets – discerning what goals would be both achievable and have a positive impact on Laurelhurst and even the City. I would also like to develop a system of management reporting – where each Board committee submits a budget so LNA knows what it has and what its obligations are. It's not at the top of my list, but eventually I would like to make financial reporting more accessible to readers of the Newsletter. I would like the Treasurer's report to be more of a summary of highlights of what LNA has been doing with its money than a profit and loss statement.

LNAN: That sounds intriguing! When you can get out from under the pile of financial reports and forecasts, how do you like to spend your time?

BE: I'm very big into cycling. I have a car, an EV, but like to use it as little as possible. So I bike to my gym in Cully and run as many errands on my bike as I can. I like to ride pieces of the 40-mile loop when I get the chance. On Patriot's Day this year, which is a holiday in Massachusetts and therefore a day off for me but nobody else in my family, I rode about 30 miles of the loop. I'm also a fan of public transportation. Malcolm is a real "train kid" -- we used to take the "T" all over the place when we lived in Boston. When we arrived in Portland we rode every MAX line to its terminus.

I've also gotten seriously into gardening. A well-developed garden came with our NW quadrant house and I've been working hard to improve it. This summer we had a lush harvest of flowers and vegetables. I got a kick out of watching Malcolm, never a big fan of vegetables, brag to his friends about our delicious cherry tomatoes.

Homeowner Elisa Leverton and her children began offering dog treats well over 25 years ago when the kids were small. They wanted to do something nice for others on Easter so they hung the treats from their curbside tree. But when Easter was over, Elisa says, the animals, oblivious to the calendar, kept arriving. "It sort of morphed into doing it throughout the year because dogs don't know the difference." Appreciative pet owners have in turn left gifts of cookies, flowers, and even wine beneath the tree, which has become a gathering spot. "We've had a lot of fun," Leverton says. "The tree took on a life of its own."

Elisa and husband Paul's children are now grown, but their tradition lives on. Not only on Ankeny Street, but roughly 10 blocks away on SE Pine Street. There, Johnyne Wascavage, inspired by the Cookie Tree, created her own dog treat station. "Elisa was my mentor," Johnyne commented. Another sharing wayside for eager pups was born! In case you are wondering, yes, inevitably the local squirrels were equally thrilled to find all those swaying goodies. Out of necessity, both Cookie Tree households have devised small treat containers to outsmart the critters.

Thanks to these generous neighbors, there are many lucky dogs in Laurelhurst licking their chops. What a great motivator for a neighborhood jaunt.

BottleDrop Update

In 2017 the Laurelhurst neighborhood was experiencing a sharp increase in petty crime, foraging in recycling bins and trespass. Speaking at a General LNA meeting, Law enforcement liaison to the LNA, Officer Sahli, said the most important crime prevention step would be to remove items of value from the parking strips and recycling bins. In 2018 the LNA authorized a neighborhood initiative to increase safe recycling of valuable containers (10 cents each) using BottleDrop, a well-organized approach to recycling under Oregon's Bottle Bill. Because newer Laurelhurst residents may not be familiar with the program, a review may be helpful.

Residents have two options:

- They may establish accounts at local markets, purchase green plastic bags for 20 cents each, collect beverage containers (cans, plastic or glass) and have the redeemed value credited to their accounts.
- Similarly, nonprofits such as the LNA, the PTA, local churches and other benevolent organizations may establish "Fundraisers" to provide blue bags to members at no cost to them. Residents deposit the full bags at nearby markets and have the funds dedicated to the selected Fundraiser.

During the first year of operation more than 200 residents joined the LNA program, generating up to \$100 per week by 2019. Funds were used to help maintain and restore our iconic Laurelhurst arches. Other projects were selected as time passed. Some residents joined Fundraisers with other nonprofits. The results over time have substantially reduced foraging, trespassing and petty crime.

Today there are bag distributors in every quadrant for convenience. With resident participation we can sustain progress to date. 

Friends of Laurelhurst Park: 2023 Update

It's been a good year so far for Friends of Laurelhurst Park (FLP), which has benefitted from new volunteers and is accomplishing many of its goals.

Monthly work parties began in April when we took advantage of spring weather to plant new ferns and shrubs. Relatively soft ground and cool temperatures encouraged plant survival, although we humans found ourselves dashing between the raindrops from time to time. After planting, we mulched with compost to keep the ground hydrated and to discourage weeds. Ongoing, we've been working hard to remove invasive species and noxious weeds to help the landscape flourish and see that the nasties don't take over.

In June we had 29 volunteers working on several large projects: a very good turnout! One project example: we removed huge mounds of invasive ivy, blackberries and nightshade which were choking the park entrance at 32nd and Pine. It took many hands. Business volunteers from NOVA gave the project a big boost, pitching in alongside us. At our July work party, there was more pruning, weeding, removing tree suckers and covering beds with mulch.

Groups like NOVA who volunteer from local businesses are a big help to FLP. *Hands On Greater Portland* provides a way for anyone in the area to find us and sign up online not only for FLP events, but for the activities of other nonprofit organizations year-round.

Many thanks to new and old volunteers; we appreciate you all and the park would not shine as it does without you. Not to mention it's fun to work together as a community. Portland Parks staff are great to work with and learn from and they appreciate our contributions. Our work parties are held on second Wednesdays from 9 am to noon through October. To join in, meet in front of the blue-green Parks building at 3600 SE Ankeny St. on the north side of the park. Please wear work shoes/clothes; all tools are supplied.





Century Home Plaques

This fall the Century Plaque Committee will once again order plaques commemorating 100-year-old homes in the Laurelhurst neighborhood. These cast and polished bronze plaques, customized with the year your home was built, are produced at Macadam Aluminum and Bronze Company. Sized at 10 inches by 2 1/2 inches, they are suitable for mounting on siding, pillars, doors, gates or other locations inside and outside your home.

If your home was built in 1924 or earlier, you are eligible to purchase a plaque. The deadline for the fall order is Friday, October 6th. You can order your plaque online using a credit card at the LNA web store or by mailing a check payable to the Laurelhurst Neighborhood Association to LNA Treasurer, 3721 SE Ankeny St., Portland OR 97214. Include a note with your name, address, email address and phone number as well as the year your home was built. The cost of the plaque is \$100; proceeds go the neighborhood association. Since the project began in 2018, over 470 neighbors with eligible homes have purchased plaques.

The Century Plaque Committee submits accumulated orders to the foundry twice a year, in spring and fall. The plaques usually arrive within two months of the order. Purchasers will be notified by email when their plaques are ready for pickup.

Secretary's Report

Key Items from the June 13, 2023 Board of Directors Meeting:

1. The Board approved up to \$1800 from the Arches Fund to clean up graffiti on one of the Glisan Arches.

2. The Board agreed with the proposed 2023 LNA Annual Picnic budget and approved expenses not to exceed \$2750.

3. The Treasurer provided a new framework to account for LNA expenses according to major project categories.

Key Items from the July 11, 2023 Board of Directors Meeting:

1. The Board heard a report on the 2023 Garage Sale which had 96 participants and net revenues of \$2485.
